Clarifies statutory exemptions from mandatory immunizations for students.

1 AN ACT concerning exemptions from mandatory immunizations for 2 students and amending P.L.1974, c.150, P.L.2002, c.58, and 3 P.L.2003, c.284. 4 5 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 6 of New Jersey: 7 8 1. Section 6 of P.L.1974, c.150 (C.26:1A-9.1) is amended to 9 read as follows: 10 6. <u>a.</u> Provisions in the State Sanitary Code in implementation 11 of [this act] P.L.1947, c.177 (C.26:1A-1 et seq.), or provisions 12 otherwise set forth in statute or regulation, which require the immunization of students in a preschool program, or at an 13 14 elementary or secondary school or an institution of higher 15 education, shall provide for an exemption [for pupils] from such 16 mandatory immunization [if the parent or guardian of the pupil objects thereto in a written statement signed by the parent or 17 guardian upon the ground that the proposed immunization interferes 18 19 with the free exercise of the pupil's religious rights. This 20 exemption] based upon one of the following: 21 (1) a written statement submitted to the preschool program, 22 elementary or secondary school, or institution of higher education, 23 as applicable, by a licensed physician, doctor of osteopathy, 24 advanced practice nurse, or physician assistant indicating that the 25 vaccine is medically contraindicated for a specific period of time 26 and the reasons for the medical contraindication, based upon valid 27 medical reasons as determined by regulation of the Commissioner 28 of Health, which shall exempt the student from the vaccination for 29 the stated period of time; or 30 (2) documentation, as set forth in subsection b. of this section, 31 which is submitted to the preschool program, elementary or 32 secondary school, or institution of higher education, as applicable, 33 by the student, or the student's parent or guardian if the student is a 34 minor, explaining how the administration of the vaccine conflicts with the bona fide religious tenets or practices of the student, or the 35 36 parent or guardian, as appropriate; except that: a general 37 philosophical or moral objection to the vaccination shall not be 38 sufficient for an exemption on religious grounds; and an exemption 39 on religious grounds may be suspended by the [State] 40 Commissioner of Health during the existence of an emergency as 41 determined by the [State Commissioner of Health] commissioner. 42 The documentation required pursuant to paragraph (2) of b. 43 subsection a. of this section shall include a written statement, which 44 shall be notarized, signed, and sworn by the person submitting the 45 statement, and which shall include:

1 (1) an explanation of the nature of the person's religious tenet or 2 practice that is implicated by the vaccination and how 3 administration of the vaccine would violate, contradict, or otherwise 4 be inconsistent with that tenet or practice; 5 (2) information that indicates that the religious tenet or practice is consistently held by the person, which may include, but need not 6 7 be limited to, expression of the person's intent to decline any 8 vaccination; 9 (3) a statement that the religious tenet or practice is not solely 10 an expression of that person's: 11 (a) political, sociological, philosophical, or moral views; or 12 (b) concerns related to the safety or efficacy of the vaccination; 13 and 14 (c) a statement that the person understands the risks and benefits 15 of vaccination to the student and the public health and 16 acknowledges that the student may be excluded from attendance at 17 the student's preschool, school, or institution of higher education, as 18 applicable, in the event of the occurrence of a communicable 19 disease or condition or threat of a communicable disease or condition, which in the opinion of the Commissioner of 20 Commissioner of Health requires such exclusion from attendance of 21 22 unvaccinated students. 23 c. A preschool program, elementary or secondary school, or 24 institution of higher education shall not exempt a student from a 25 mandatory immunization unless the student, or the student's parent 26 or guardian if the student is a minor, complies with all of the 27 applicable requirements set forth in subsections a. and b. of this 28 section. 29 d. The Commissioner of Health, pursuant to the 30 "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.), shall adopt rules and regulations to effectuate the purposes of 31 32 this section; except that, notwithstanding any provision of P.L.1968, 33 c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.) to the contrary, the commissioner may 34 adopt, immediately upon filing with the Office of Administrative 35 Law, such regulations as the commissioner deems necessary to 36 implement the provisions of this section, which shall be effective 37 for a period not to exceed six months and may thereafter be 38 amended, adopted, or re-adopted by the commissioner in 39 accordance with the requirements of P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 40 et seq.). 41 (cf: P.L.1974, c.150, s.6) 42 43 2. Section 4 of P.L.2002, c.58 (C.18A:61D-10) is amended to 44 read as follows: 45 4. A student shall not be required to receive a vaccination pursuant to section 2 or 3 of [this act based upon one of the 46 47 following:

a. a written statement submitted to the secondary school or 1 2 institution of higher education, as applicable, by a licensed 3 physician indicating that the vaccine is medically contraindicated 4 for a specific period of time and the reasons for the medical 5 contraindication, based upon valid medical reasons as determined by regulation of the Commissioner of Health and Senior Services, 6 which shall exempt the student from the vaccination for the stated 7 8 period of time; or 9 b. a written statement submitted to the secondary school or 10 institution of higher education, as applicable, by the student, or the

student's parent or guardian if the student is a minor, explaining 11 12 how the administration of the vaccine conflicts with the bona fide 13 religious tenets or practices of the student, or the parent or guardian, 14 as appropriate; except that a general philosophical or moral 15 objection to the vaccination shall not be sufficient for an exemption 16 on religious grounds] P.L.2002, c.58 (C.18A:61D-9 or C.18A:40-17 21.1) if the student qualifies for an exemption as provided in section 18 6 of P.L.1974, c.150 (C.26:1A-9.1).

21 3. Section 3 of P.L.2003, c.284 (C.18A:62-15.2) is amended to 22 read as follows:

3. a. A student shall not be required to receive a vaccination
pursuant to subsection a. of section 2 of **[**this act based upon one of
the following:

(1) a written statement submitted to the institution of higher education by a licensed physician indicating that the vaccine is medically contraindicated for a specific period of time and the reasons for the medical contraindication, based upon valid medical reasons as determined by regulation of the Commissioner of Health and Senior Services, which shall exempt the student from the vaccination for the stated period of time; or

33 (2) a written statement submitted to the institution of higher 34 education by the student, or the student's parent or guardian if the student is a minor, explaining how the administration of the vaccine 35 36 conflicts with the bona fide religious tenets or practices of the 37 student, or the parent or guardian, as appropriate; except that a 38 general philosophical or moral objection to the vaccination shall not 39 be sufficient for an exemption on religious grounds P.L.2003, 40 c.284 (C.18A:62-15.1) if the student qualifies for an exemption as 41 provided in section 6 of P.L.1974, c.170 (C.26:1A-9.1).

b. In the event of an actual or threatened outbreak of meningitis
at a public or private institution of higher education in this State,
the institution may exclude from attendance a student who has been
exempted from the vaccination requirement of this act pursuant to
subsection a. of this section, as determined by the Commissioner of
Health [and Senior Services].

4. This act shall take effect immediately. **STATEMENT** This bill provides statutory clarification for the State policy governing exemptions from immunizations of students that are mandated by the Commissioner of Health by regulation or otherwise required by law. The bill stipulates that provisions in the State Sanitary Code, or provisions otherwise set forth in statute or regulation, which require the immunization of students at an elementary or secondary school or an institution of higher education, are to provide for an exemption from such mandatory immunization based upon one of the following: • a written statement submitted to the elementary or secondary school or the institution of higher education, as applicable, by a licensed physician indicating that the vaccine is medically contraindicated for a specific period of time and the reasons for the medical contraindication, based upon valid medical reasons as determined by regulation of the Commissioner of Health, which is to exempt the student from the vaccination for the stated period of time; or • documentation submitted to the elementary or secondary school or the institution of higher education, as applicable, by the student, or the student's parent or guardian if the student is a minor, explaining how the administration of the vaccine conflicts with the bona fide religious tenets or practices of the student, or the parent or guardian, as appropriate; except that: a general philosophical or moral objection to the vaccination is not sufficient for an exemption on religious grounds; and an exemption on religious grounds may be suspended by the Commissioner of Health during the existence of an emergency as determined by the commissioner. The bill sets forth the specific elements that are required to document that the administration of a vaccine conflicts with the bona fide religious tenets or practices of a student, or a student's parent or guardian, as appropriate. These include the following: • a written statement, to be notarized, signed, and sworn by the person submitting the statement, and which includes: -- an explanation of the nature of the person's religious tenet or practice that is implicated by the vaccination and how administration of the vaccine would violate, contradict, or otherwise be inconsistent with that tenet or practice; -- information that indicates that the religious tenet or practice is consistently held by the person, which may include, but need not be limited to, expression of the person's intent to decline any vaccination;

-- a statement that the religious tenet or practice is not solely an
expression of that person's political, sociological, philosophical, or
moral views, or concerns related to the safety or efficacy of the
vaccination; and

5 -- a statement that the person understands the risks and benefits of vaccination to the student and the public health and 6 7 acknowledges that the student may be excluded from attendance at 8 the student's school or institution of higher education, as applicable, in the event of the occurrence of a communicable disease or 9 condition or threat of a communicable disease or condition, which 10 in the opinion of the Commissioner of Health requires such 11 12 exclusion from attendance of unvaccinated students; and

a signed statement from a physician licensed to practice in this
State, or another individual as designated by the Commissioner
of Health, that the person has received individual counseling
from the physician, or other individual as appropriate,
concerning the risks and benefits of vaccination to the student
and the public health.

19 The bill prohibits an elementary or secondary school or 20 institution of higher education from exempting a student from a 21 mandatory immunization unless the student, or the student's parent 22 or guardian if the student is a minor, complies with all of the 23 applicable requirements set forth in the bill.

The bill provides the Commissioner of Health with expedited rulemaking authority in order to provide such guidance to school and public health authorities as they will need to implement its provisions on a timely basis.
